Cancer statistics

- It's estimated that 151,000 Australians were diagnosed with cancer in 2021 that's over 400 per day.
- Almost 1 in 2 Australians will be diagnosed with cancer by the age of 85.
- It's estimated that over 1 million Australians are currently living with cancer.
- The number of new Australian cancer cases diagnosed over the period from 2020-2044 is projected to total more than 4.56 million.
- Around 70% of people will likely survive five years after a cancer diagnosis. This is an increase from 51% since the late 1980s.
- The number of Australians living with or beyond cancer is expected to increase by a staggering 72% in the next 22 years.
- By 2040, 1.9 million Australians will be living with, or beyond cancer.
